5 Project Background

Papua is widely recognized as one of the most disadvantaged provinces in Indonesia, grappling with inadequate access to essential services. According to recent data released by the Central Bureau of Statistics (BPS) in 2021, a mere 40.81% of the population of Papua (with 84.55% residing in urban areas and 24.12% in rural areas) has access to basic sanitation, which is significantly below the national average of 80.29%. However, there has been a significant improvement in the aforementioned figure after the separation of 29 districts and cities in Papua Province into three new provinces, namely Central Papua Province (comprising of 8 districts), South Papua Province (with 4 districts), and Mountainous Papua Province (consisting of 8 districts). Currently, the latest statistics indicate that 62.20% of the population in nine districts and cities of Papua Province has access to basic sanitation, with 10.32% having access to

safely managed sanitation. Additionally, only 4.56% of the Papuan population is still practicing open defecation. In term of access to Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) in Schools, based on the latest figure published by Ministry of Education and Culture, only 7,08% schools (including ECD centres, primary and secondary schools) in Papua that have access to basic water, basic sanitation and basic hygiene are all available. Furthermore, in four out of five schools do not have handwashing facility with soap and running water. Similarly, access to WASH in Health Care Facility (HCF) in Papua is below national rate. For example, Papua is one of the highest provinces with the percentage of Puskesmas that do not have access to basic water (52.87%), do not have access to basic sanitation (67.42%) and only 7.03% have access to hygiene. WASH in Schools Profile 2022 reported very poor menstrual hygiene management in Papua Province. There are 2 out of 3 students in Papua Province do not have access to separated toilet between boys and girls. Furthermore only 19,64% schools in Papua Province that provide spare menstrual pads. This condition has created negative impact to 16 million of adolescent girls and could potentially triggered high absenteeism among girls in Papua. Biak Numfor District is one of the advanced districts in terms of sanitation access within the nine districts and cities in Papua Province. According to the Provincial Health Office, as of April 25th 2023, 247 out of 268 villages in Biak Numfor District have been declared Open Defecation Free (ODF) villages. This signifies that only 21 villages remain to be declared ODF before Biak Numfor District can attain the status of being the first Open Defecation Free district in Papua Land. The praiseworthy commitment demonstrated by the Biak Numfor government regarding the ODF initiative has created an opportunity for UNICEF to support the district in fulfilling all five pillars of Community-Based Total Sanitation or Sanitasi Total Berbasis Masyarakat (STBM) in all villages. Furthermore, UNICEF sees the potential for Biak Numfor to transition towards safely managed sanitation that incorporates elements of climate resiliency and adaptiveness, inclusivity, sustainability, and disaster risk reduction. Moreover, with the Biak Numfor government's unwavering commitment, UNICEF is confident in providing support for enhancing Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH) in Schools and WASH in Health Care Facilities. Additionally, UNICEF will assist the Biak Numfor government in mainstreaming and implementing Menstrual Health and Hygiene Management (MHM) in both the community and institutions such as schools and health facilities. UNICEF is commencing a project titled "Transformative and Nurturing Good Governance to Achieve Universal Access on Safely Managed Sanitation and Hygiene (TANGGUH) in Biak Numfor." The official title of the project in the Indonesian language is "Pendampingan Tata Kelola yang Transformatif untuk Mewujudkan Akses Universal pada Sanitasi dan Higienis yang Dikelola Secara Aman di Biak Numfor (Biak Numfor TANGGUH)." Overview of Biak Numfor TANGGUH Project The Biak Numfor TANGGUH project will comprise several key outputs, with the following strategies and approaches: 1. High-Level Advocacy and Strengthening of WASH Governance: 2. Public Awareness-Raising through Various Youth, Cultural, and Religious Channels 3. Location of Direct and Indirect Intervention: The proposed interventions align with our new CPAP output 21, 2.2, and 2.4 which aims to move toward safely managed sanitation, eliminate open defecation, and ensure climate resillient WASH

Conduct one Advocacy Horizontal Learning on transition toward STBM GEDSI five pillars and Safely Managed Sanitation agenda 1.3. Support the development of planning document and regulations on GEDSI and climate resilient safely managed sanitation 1.4. Capacity building for government officials on WASH GEDSI, climate resilient, and transition toward Safely Managed Sanitation 1.5. Conduct technical learning exchange (twining) for safely managed sanitation 1.6. Develop knowledge management product to be disseminated during AHL in Biak Output 2: Government officials, Youth activists, Cultural and Religious leaders' have capacity to sensitize community on the important of all five pillars of STBM that has incorporated GEDSI and climate resilient element, including improved menstrual hygiene behaviour Key activities to achieve the output: 2.1. Strengthen capacity on STBM and MHM for Government officials, Youth activists, Women, Cultural, and religious leaders. 2.2. Expand ODF Villages Toward Fulfilment of Five Pillars of STBM with Inclusive and Climate Adaptive Approaches through triggering sessions 2.3. Establish a model of GEDSI and climate resilient sanitation facility in selected kampung 2.4. Support the implementation and integration of MHM into Posyandu Remaja and PKPR in selected Puskesmas Output 3: Institutions such as, schools, madrasah and primary health care facility have access to GEDSI sensitive and climate adaptive WASH facility, including improved management of menstrual health and hygiene. Key activities to achieve the output: 3.1 Assessment of WASH facilities in targeted schools 3.2 Assessment of WASH facilities in primary health care facilities 3.3 Facilitate capacity building for health officials (Puskesmas and Dinas Kesehatan) on WASHFIT methodology integrating climate resilience and GEDSI, 3.4 Assessment of WASH facilities for health workers, teachers, and headmasters on WASH in Schools and MHM including Oky Apps 3.5 Conduct series of socialization, campaign, and dissemination of WASH inclusive and climate
